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### Tom Knicklebine Hands-on Restorer of the B. Harley Bradley House

The year 2025 marks the 125th Anniversary of Frank Lloyd Wright's B. Harley Bradley House, designed in 1900 and completed in 1901. This celebration would not have happened, had the house not been restored in 2005-2010. Gaines & Sharon Hall are recognized for their completion of the monumental task of bringing the House back to the original floor plan Wright designed for the Bradley family. The Halls, however, share an important, additional story. about a man named Tom Knicklebine, a native of Kankakee and son of Edward and Barbara Knicklebine. Tom was the hands-on restorer of the B. Harley Bradley house and should be recognized as the reason the restoration occurred and was done so in an excellent fashion. Tom earned his architectural degree from the University of Idaho. After graduation, he returned to Kankakee and worked for a time with the local architectural firm of Turner and Witt alongside the current Executive Director of Wright In Kankakee, Bob Bohlmann. hired at the architectural office, the economy stagnated so Tom left the firm and began working as a carpenter with his father and uncle who were well-respected builders in the area. Tom never returned to the drawing board full time.

The B. Harley Bradley House, a masterpiece of Prairie School architecture, designed by the renowned architect Frank Lloyd Wright, stands as a testament to the innovative spirit of early 20th-century American design. However, by the early 2000s, the house had fallen into disrepair, its grandeur fading with time. It was during this period that Tom Knicklebine emerged as a pivotal figure in the restoration efforts that spanned from 2005 to 2010.

Tom Knicklebine's involvement in the restoration of the B. The Harley Bradley House was distinguished by his steadfast commitment to maintaining the architectural integrity and historical importance of this landmark. As a craftsman in woodwork with a design sensitivity, Knicklebine brought to the project a wealth of experience and meticulous attention to detail, ensuring that every aspect of the restoration honored Frank Lloyd Wright's original vision.

Additionally, Tom Knicklebine's expertise in woodworking played a significant role in the restoration project's success. He worked diligently to reproduce missing elements of the house and employed traditional craftsmanship techniques to repair and replace damaged elements. Whether it was restoring the almost unsavable stable or refurbishing the intricate woodwork, Knicklebine's commitment to authenticity was evident in every detail. His wife Joan was always there supporting him throughout the entire project. Without his careful attention to details and an understanding of architectural design, the finished product never would have been realized.

Beyond the physical restoration, Knicklebine recognized the historic value of the property and understood house and stable not only as a preserved historical site but also as a living museum that could inspire and educate future generations about the importance of architectural preservation.

In conclusion, Tom Knicklebine's role in the 2005-2010 restoration of the B. Harley Bradley House was marked by his leadership, research, material expertise, and educational advocacy. His contributions were instrumental in reviving this architectural gem, "the house that changed the face of American architecture," ensuring that it continues to stand as a testament to Frank Lloyd Wright's genius and as a source of inspiration for preservationists and architecture enthusiasts alike.


